UNIVERSITY

Rangsit University is a private university located in Pathum Thani province, which is about 25 kilometers north of Bangkok. It is easily accessible by train, taxi, TukTuk, local Vans, Taxi-Motorbikes or by foot. The highest price (longest distance possible) for the redline train is 38 Baht for students (about 1€), the school Van costs 10 Baht (about 30cents) no matter where you take it from, the Taxi from the nearest train station in Lak Hok is between 40-45 Baht (about 1,10€) and for the same distance the motorbikes are 25Baht (about 25Cents). That already assumes that you live in Bangkok city, though, and you have to travel to the University like we did. However, there are a lot of student apartments right at the campus, which makes the University accessible by foot. (all prices from 2022/23)

COURSES

Rangsit University is offering a great variety of courses throughout each term. There is everything you need from social skills to general topics and many more specialized topics. Since it was our 5th term, we only had to choose 4 subjects to complete.

The first subject we choose was ICT Game Design & Programming. This is a course offered by the Rangsit University's Faculty of Information Technology. It is a part of the Bachelor of Science in Information and Communication Technology program and focuses on game design, development, and programming.

The main objective of the ICT Game Design & Programming course is to provide students with a comprehensive understanding of game design principles, as well as the skills and

knowledge necessary to create their own games. The course covers a range of topics related to game development, including game design, programming, graphics, and audio.

Throughout the course, we learned how to design a game using Unity. Furthermore, we did learn about game mechanics, game physics, and game AI, as well as how to optimize game performance and create multiplayer games.

The course is structured around a series of lectures, and projects that allow students to apply what they have learned in a real-world context. We worked on individual and group projects that involve designing and building games from scratch using Unity game Engine.

The next subject was ICT 304 Information Assurance & Security. This course focuses on the social and professional issues related to the use of information and communication technology.

The main objective of the ICT 302 course is to help students develop a critical understanding of the social and ethical implications of technology use, as well as to develop the professional skills necessary to work in the ICT industry. Since we are students of the IT faculty of Austria this was also a course offered by Rangsit University's Faculty of Information Technology as part of the Bachelor of Science in Information and Communication Technology program. This course focuses on the legal frameworks that govern the use of information and communication technology.

The main objective of the ICT 210 course is to provide students with a comprehensive understanding of the legal issues related to the use of information technology. The course covers a range of topics related to information technology laws, including intellectual property, privacy, data protection, and cybercrime.

The course is structured around a series of lectures, discussions, and assignments. Like in Social & Professional Issues we had to do assignments with our own topics, write papers and present it after to the crowd.

ACCOMANDATION

Since Bangkok is huge Metropolitan area, there are several accommodations available. These accommodations reach from poor standards to highly advanced rooftop penthouses. Since we are students and don't have that much money available, we decided to bock a fairly good place in the city center so we can see a lot from the city itself.

Our place was in the district called Bang Sue. It was a private AirBnb flat with a stunning view over the city and the Chao Prayer River. Furthermore, it overed a gym and a rooftop pool which we enjoyed a lot, due to the fact that Bangkok has a tropical climate and high humidity all over the year. We paid a total of around $600 \in$ a month, which is pretty much compared to the average wage in Thailand.

The location of the flat was just perfect, despite the fact that it was quite far away from university. We only had to walk a few hundred meters to get to the subway, which carries you around the city. Many famous destinations like the Chatuchak-Weekend-Market, the Grand Palace or Khao San Road were just around the corner.

TRANSPORTAION

They are also used by commuters to travel between different parts of the city. Foreigners have to be careful, which organization of water taxis they take. The local people try to convince you to ride with the more expensive boats by telling you that they were faster. Be persistent and insists on going with the cheaper ones, which are as fast and as convenient.
